

Saskatchewan Consumer Price Index

February 2015

According to Statistics Canada, the Saskatchewan All-items Consumer Price Index increased 0.9 percent between January 2015 and February 2015, while the Canada All-items Index increased 0.9 percent. The Regina and Saskatoon All-items Consumer Price Index both rose 0.9 percent.

In Saskatchewan, the February 2015 All-items Index increased from January 2015 primarily due to higher prices for gasoline, travel tours, women's clothing and men's clothing. Prices also rose for internet access service, homeowners' home and mortgage insurance and fresh fruit.

Moderating these increases were lower prices for purchase and leasing of passenger vehicles, non-alcoholic beverages, dairy products and furniture. Prices also fell for children's clothing, fresh or frozen chicken and sugar and confectionary.

The Saskatchewan All-items Consumer Price Index advanced 1.2 percent between February 2014 and February 2015, while the Canada All-items Index increased 1.0 percent. The Regina and Saskatoon All-items Consumer Price Index climbed 1.1 percent and 1.5 percent, respectively, during the same period.

The February 2015 All-items Index increased from February 2014 primarily due to higher prices for natural gas, passenger vehicle insurance premiums, travel tours and fresh or frozen beef. Prices also increased for water, rent and food purchased from restaurants.

These increases were partially offset by lower prices for gasoline, purchase and leasing of passenger vehicles, fuel oil and other fuels and children's clothing. Prices also decreased for home entertainment equipment, parts and services, travel accommodation and bakery products.
