

Saskatchewan Income

2016 Census of Canada

Total Income

According to the 2016 Census, Saskatchewan residents earned a total of about \$32.8 billion in 2015. Market income is the source of 89.5% of total income, which was 1.2 percentage points higher than the national average of 88.3%. The remaining 10.5% of income comes from government transfers.

The largest share of total income, 73.2%, came from employment. This was higher than the Canadian average of 72.0%.

Median after-tax household income in Saskatchewan was \$78,536, above the national average of \$73,344.

Income by CMA

According to the 2016 Census, Regina and Saskatoon had median personal incomes of \$43,434 and \$40,641 respectively. Regina ranked 3rd highest amongst the 37 CMA's in Canada, while Saskatoon ranked 6th highest. The median CMA was Winnipeg with a median personal income of \$35,706.

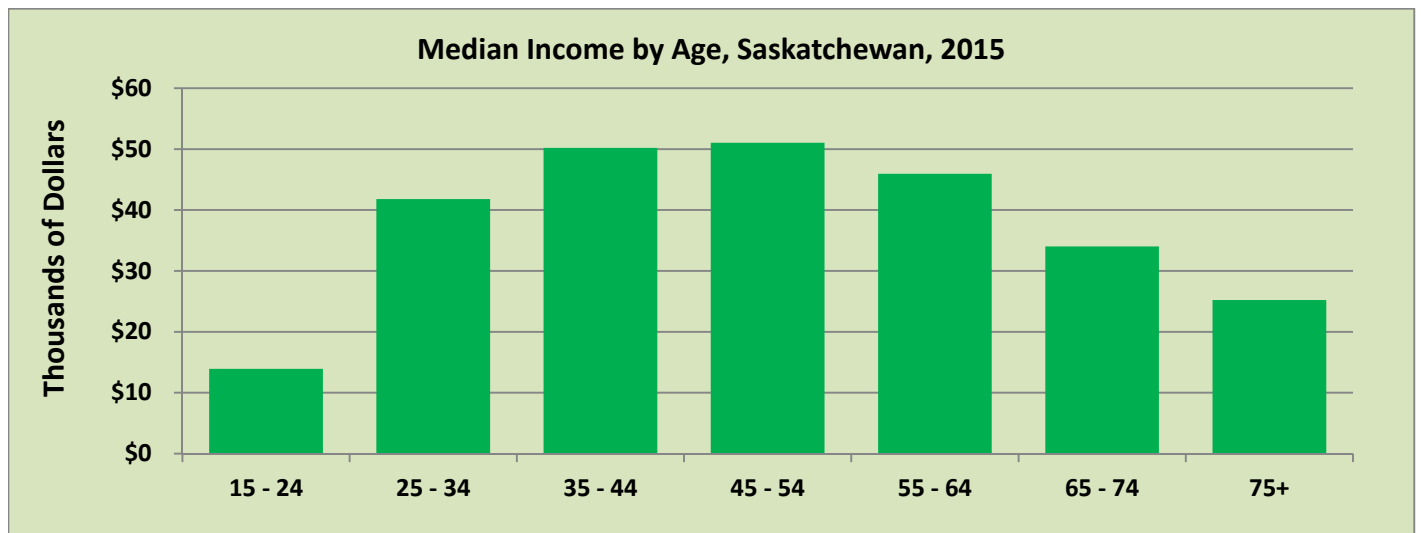
Income by Source

Of the 1,098,352 people recorded living in Saskatchewan by the 2016 Census 822,620 reported having an income in 2015; of those 636,950 reported having employment income and 273,040 reported having investment income. There were 194,215 people who reported receiving CPP benefits and 145,380 who reported receiving old age security.

Income by Group

According to the 2016 Census, a total of 224,160 people in Saskatchewan over the age of 15 earned less than \$20,000; representing 26.1% of the population, this is 3.8 percentage points less than the nation rate of 29.9%. A total of 79,030 people in Saskatchewan had incomes of \$100,000 or more; representing 9.2% of the population, this is 1.3 percentage points more than the national rate of 7.9%.
